



The Indwelling

What Should this Truth Mean to Me?

Philippians 2:9-18

The practical implications of the living God dwelling in me are numerous. Obviously, if my body is the temple of the indwelling Spirit, then I must avoid any act which would desecrate that holy temple. I must remember that my body belongs to Him (*1 Cor. 6:20*), and my bodily members must be yielded to the God who lives within (*Rom. 6:13*). I should realize that sin is not only against God and a violation of His holy standards (*Gen. 39:9; Psalm 51:4*), but it also causes the One who is in me to be deeply grieved (*Eph. 4:30*).

The realization of God living in me should also revolutionize the way I view the Christian life. Instead of seeking to avoid bad habits (often failing to do so) or struggling to fulfill certain requirements and duties, I need to realize that God wants to do something in me: “for it is God that worketh in you both to will and to do of His good pleasure” (*Phil. 2:13*). My emphasis should be on allowing the indwelling One to express His life and His light in and through me: “Let your light so shine before men....that the life also of Jesus might be made manifest in our body” (*Matt. 5:16; 2 Cor. 4:10-11*). “Christ liveth in me” (*Gal. 2:20*) should be the fact that transforms my every daily act!

When tempted to worry, I remember that the One living in me is never worried about anything. When fear overcomes me, I can realize that the God inhabiting my heart can still every storm with His “Peace, be still.” When lonely, I rejoice that He is not only with me but in me; I am a partaker of His very life. When distressed by national and global events, I rejoice that the One living in me is sovereign over every nation and event!
