Seeing Ourselves Properly

Galatians 6:1-10

In pride, we tend to overestimate our own importance. "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think; but to think soberly, according as God hath dealt to every man the measure of faith" (*Rom. 12:3*). I must think correctly about myself, and not be puffed up with an exaggerated and unrealistic idea of my own importance and superiority. I must not have a high, lofty, proud view of myself; I need to have God's view of myself, seeing myself as God does.



The following illustrates the perspective of true humility:

A little tree, short but self-satisfied, glanced toward the ground then tossed its head and cried, "Behold, how tall I am, how far from earth!" And boasting thus, it swayed in scornful mirth. The tallest pine tree in the forest raised its head toward heaven, and sighed all the while it gazed, "Alas, how small am I, and great skies how far; what years of space 'twixt me and yonder star." Our height depends on what we measure by—if up from earth, or downward from the sky!

Paul states, "For if a man think himself to be something, when he is nothing, he deceiveth himself" (*Gal. 6:3*).

The egotist constantly fails to appreciate his indebtedness to God and to others for whatever success he may be fortunate enough to achieve. A boasting man may be likened to the mouse in the fable, which walked with an elephant across a bridge. The bridge shook and trembled under the heavy tread of the elephant. When they reached the other side, the mouse said to the elephant, "We surely did shake that thing, didn't we?"


How we need to overemphasize God's importance, having as our only desire to exalt His holy Person!
